In answer to the first general interrogatory the deponent says my name is Anderson Holt. My age [is] 52 years. My residence [is] near Merry Oaks, Chatham County, North Carolina. My occupation [is] a farmer.

I am not related to Richard C. Cotton and I have no beneficial interest in the claim.

I was not present, but passed by at the time some of the property was taken.

I saw some 2 or 3 sacks of flour taken from Mr. Cotten's premises by United States soldiers. I was passing by Mr. Cotton's gate with a portion of General Sherman's army when I saw the flour taken from his place. I was with the army by request of General Mitchell to show them the road. I did not see anything else taken. I was well acquainted with Mr. Cotton's premises and the crib that the corn was taken from. I believe [it] would hold sixty barrels of corn.

Deposition [of] Anderson Holt

In answer to the first general interrogatory the deponent says my name is Anderson Holt. My age [is] 52 years. My residence [is] near Merry Oaks, Chatham County, North Carolina. My occupation [is] a farmer.

I am not related to the claimant Richard C. Cotton and I have no beneficial interest with [the] claim.

I have been acquainted with the claimant ever since I was a boy and was intimately acquainted with him throughout the war…lived one mile from him. See him nearly every week before he was carried off to the army.

[I] conversed often with him about the war. I was an adherent to the union cause and was so regarded by the claimant. He always talked against the war and in favor of the union. I believe his sympathies [were] with the cause and government of the United States throughout the war and wished its success. I believe so from his conversations on the subject. I conversed with him alone and in the presence of others. He was publicly regarded so as a union man and especially so by his loyal neighbors.

I never knew him to contribute any money of property to aid the union cause or its army. I never knew him to be molested of threatened with inquiry or account of his union sentiments. I never knew him to contribute anything in any way to aid the Confederate Government or its officers or soldiers or to own any Confederate bonds or do anything to sustain the credit of the Confederate States. I know of no acts of his but he was regarded as a union man. I cannot say how he would stood towards the Confederacy had it been established.
